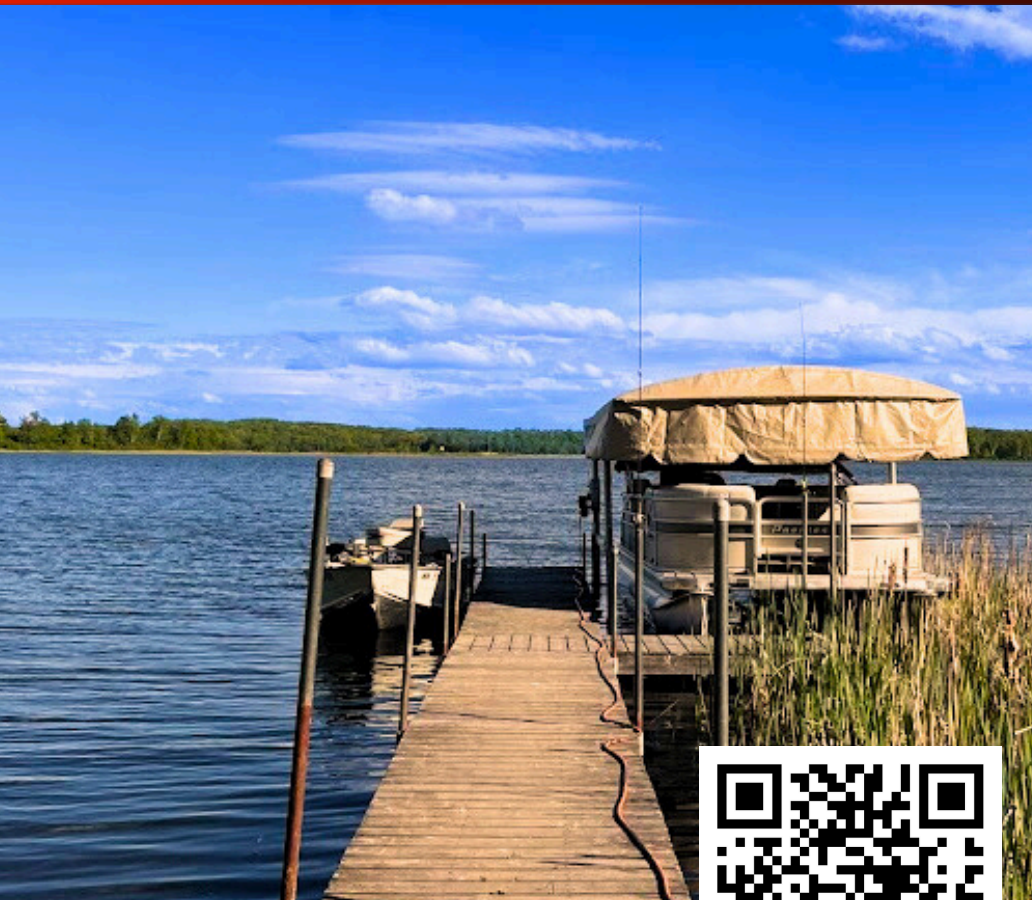

Letter from Executive Director Jeff Forester

Congratulations to you all—Minnesota Lakes and Rivers (MLR) turned 30 in 2024. Our organization started with a simple understanding: if future generations are to hear the call of the loon, catch a breakfast of walleye or crappie, or sit by a campfire under the Milky Way, looking out over the black-silver surface of a moonlit lake, we must work together to protect these things.

This annual report is not only an update on 2024, but also a look back on the three decades of MLR's presence in the state

In 1993, cabin owners on Pine Island, Lake Vermilion, raised concerns about rising property taxes that were forcing the sale and subdivision of a sensitive shoreline. As they walked the "shoreline trail," they found others who shared their concerns — and began to organize. They planted the seed for what is now the largest and most effective organization dedicated to protecting our state's lakes and rivers. Since our early days, the challenges facing our lakes and rivers have grown in number, complexity, and urgency.

In a time of division, MLR remains a rigorously bipartisan and highly political organization, with members in every Minnesota legislative district—and in every state across the country. Evenly split between Republicans and Democrats, our members are united by a shared commitment to protecting our lake and river heritage for current and future generations.

In 2021, MLR engaged in hundreds of conversations with members, Tribal nations, policymakers, and partners across the state

to identify the biggest challenges facing our waters. We quickly learned that in order to protect our lakes and rivers, **MLR must build greater political power.**

Following this fact-finding mission, MLR adopted a clear purpose:

"Develop the civic imagination, leadership, and infrastructure needed to organize sustainable partnerships between government and community with the capacity to address complex public policy issues related to protecting, preserving, and strengthening Minnesota's lakes and rivers."

To achieve this purpose, we established four strategic priorities:

- Invest in *civic* leadership development to build and sustain strong partnerships,
- Structure programs that align resources and capacity for lake associations,
- Advance a legislative agenda grounded in trust and collaboration and,
- Ensure fiscal sustainability to support MLR into the next decade.

In 2024, we created Minnesota Lakes and Rivers Protection and Education (MLR P&E), a fully tax-deductible charitable organization.

We also launched the *Water Connects Us All* fundraising campaign. This campaign will allow MLR P&E to meet urgent local needs for lake and river protection and restoration. For the first time, you can include MLR in your charitable giving through IRA rollovers, stock transfers, donor-advised funds, and estate plans. 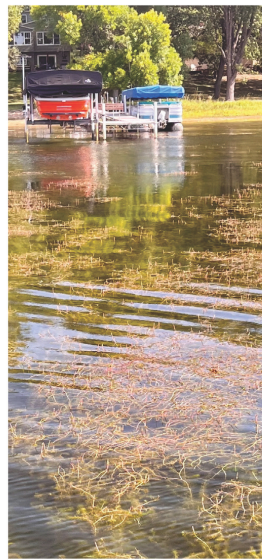

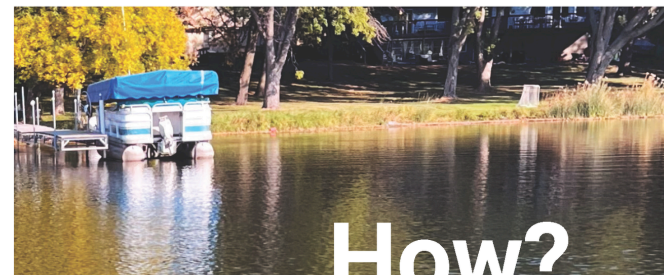
With over 200,000 Minnesotans in lake associations, imagine the power we'd have if each became an MLR member—together, we would be the strongest voice for water at the State Capitol.

Programs

MLR's programs strengthen lake associations by addressing real-world challenges with the latest science. Through collaboration and shared accountability, we drive meaningful lake and river conservation statewide.

Lake Steward

Minnesota holds 5% of the world's freshwater and more shoreline than Hawaii, Florida, and California combined. Yet, over half of our native shorelines have been lost, leading to declining water quality, loss of wildlife habitat, and more frequent harmful algae blooms.

The land closest to the water is vital for lake health, but many lakeshore homeowners are unaware of how their shoreline practices affect the long-term sustainability both for the lake and their investments in it. The Lake Steward Program partners with lake associations, county resource managers, and local citizens statewide to help property owners assess and improve behaviors by the shore.

Through a simple quiz and personalized guidance from local experts (often their neighbors), homeowners learn how to restore habitat, reduce erosion, and manage runoff. Then they're rewarded for it with the Lake Steward sign!

As of 2024, 41 lake associations are now carrying the program, over 300 signs have been awarded, symbolizing the growing movement among Minnesotans to restore native and natural shorelines.

City of Lake Stewards

MLR is excited to launch the City of Lake Stewards, adapting our proven Lake Steward model to an urban pipeshed approach around Lake Harriet with support from the Minneapolis Foundation. By partnering with neighborhood associations, metro nonprofits, and

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local high schools, we're teaching students how curbs act like shorelines, carrying runoff into lakes and rivers.

This pilot is kicking off in summer of 2025 and will build the next generation of lake advocates and, with future support, expand statewide to strengthen local lake protection efforts in cities across Minnesota.

Stop Starry Stonewort

What began as a small pilot with just three CD3 boat cleaning stations has grown into a powerful, statewide effort to stop the spread of starry stonewort and other aquatic invasive species (AIS). With support from the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund, over the past three years, Stop Starry Stonewort has expanded to 30 stations across 21 lakes – now logging more than 22,000 uses a summer.

These waterless stations help turn AIS awareness into action, giving boaters effective tools to protect

our lakes from a variety of aquatic hitchhikers. In 2024, Stop Starry Stonewort was promoted at over 50 events and our AIS awareness campaigns received millions of impressions online.

Our program is also backing local innovation – testing management strategies like diver-assisted suction harvesting, biodegradable benthic barriers, handpulling, and early detection.

At its heart, Stop Starry Stonewort is fueled by regional collaboration. Lake associations, Tribal Nations, counties, and state agencies are working side by side to build lasting, community-driven solutions for AIS prevention and management.

Since 2019, MLR has used our Civic Organizing Framework to develop and grow the Aquatic Invasive Species Boundary Waters Collaborative—known as the ABC. This initiative is rooted in the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness (BWCAW), one of Minnesota's most iconic and ecologically significant watersheds.

The BWCAW spans multiple jurisdictions—including Tribal Nations, local governments, and state, federal, and international agencies. It also supports a vibrant network of rural lakeshore communities and attracts millions of out-of-state visitors annually.

These waters sustain businesses like breweries, restaurants, marinas, outfitters, resorts, and vacation rentals, while serving as the cultural and ecological backbone of the region.

The ABC brings together leaders with deep local knowledge, diverse constituencies, and valuable resources, aligning them around a shared mission: to protect the culture, ecology, and heritage that make Minnesota's Arrowhead region so unique.

Stewardship of these waters is led not only by agencies, but also by coalitions of lake associations and their members—citizens such as anglers, cabin owners, canoeists, hunters, paddling guides, resort staff, and youth summer campers—who all have a personal stake in the health of the BWCAW watershed. By coordinating leadership across institutions and organizations operating in and around the region

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—and pooling resources among Tribes, water managers, county coalitions, and community groups—the ABC is building the civic infrastructure needed to safeguard this extraordinary place.

ABC's key efforts include installing and maintaining cleaning stations and educational signage at high-traffic access points, providing AIS awareness tools, QR code reporting, and supplies to Clean, Drain, and Dry boats and gear.

Leaders also coordinate regional education and outreach at high-visibility community events such as the Tower and Ely Fourth of July Parades and the Blueberry Festival, raising awareness among residents and visitors. The ABC successfully integrated

prevention messaging into BWCAW permit education and developed outreach materials for resorts, VRBO hosts, outfitters, and local businesses.

Preventing and monitoring AIS in the remote and interconnected waterways of the BWCAW requires strong partnerships and ongoing civic coordination.

The ABC is leading the way—demonstrating how collaborative organizing can protect one of Minnesota's most pristine ecosystems for generations to come.

Legislative Agenda

MLR's legislative agenda is shaped through partnerships to protect Minnesota's lakes and rivers. We use strategic planning and civic standards to support policies that serve the common good.

You give MLR the political leverage that makes us the advocacy powerhouse for our lakes and rivers.

The 2024 session was extremely short, mid February to mid-May.

This meant that there would be very little time for complex or controversial legislation to work its way through the process.

This year, MLR prioritized a clear, focused legislative agenda, advancing issues where we've already made meaningful progress:

- Reduce the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS),
- Reduce user conflicts on the lake and shoreline and aquatic plant destruction due to boat wakes and prop thrust,
- Protect and improve lake ecology.

Aquatic Invasive Species:

Early in the session MLR received an Emerging Issues grant in the amount of \$385,000

from the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund to provide boat cleaning equipment at accesses infested with starry stonewort. The grant also provides funding for education, outreach, signage and boat cleaning tools at all accesses.

This grant has allowed MLR to support an expansion of on the ground AIS efforts. When starry

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stonewort was discovered on Lake Pokegama, MLR was able to provide them with a mobile CD3 boat cleaning station to help contain the spread.

We also worked with the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) to extend a \$3,820,000 grant.

This funding is allocated “to prioritize, support, and develop research-based solutions that can reduce the effects of aquatic invasive species in Minnesota by preventing spread, controlling populations, and managing ecosystems and to advance knowledge to inspire action by others,” until June 30, 2028.

Boat Wrap Recycling

The winterization of boats produces an estimated 6.25 million pounds of plastic every year, with the vast majority of that clogging our landfills and costing considerable public expenses. MLR worked on a bill to require the producers of boat wrap to implement and finance a statewide product stewardship program according to a plan approved by the commissioner to reduce the volume of boat wrap disposed of in landfills by promoting and providing for the negotiation and execution of agreements to collect, transport,

reuse, and recycle boat wrap.” The estimated cost to the consumer of this is about .025%.

The “No Junk Fish” Bill

Anglers once urged the DNR to manage game fish, but other native species—like burbot, bigmouth buffalo, bowfin, gar, mooneye, and redhorse—remained unstudied and unregulated. While aquatic plants are strictly protected, native fish could be killed without limits. These so-called “junk fish” are often destroyed or used as fertilizer. MLR met with the National Association of Bow Fishermen and MN DNR Fisheries to build support among anglers, lake associations, researchers, and

polymakers to address this. In 2024, the MN legislature passed “First-in-the-Nation” legislation funding rough fish research and authorizing the DNR to set take limits, seasons, penalties for illegal harvest, and ban fishing contests for native rough fish.

Helium Extraction

Language was enacted concerning Helium exploration in the arrowhead, establishing that the state can tax extracted Helium and the DNR has rulemaking authority over extraction activities. Work to set science-based standards is ongoing.

Conclusion

More than 75% of voters renewed the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund in 2024, proving that clean water is a core Minnesota value.

Water brings families together, inspires stewardship, and unites us beyond politics.

MLR is a citizen-led movement rooted in unity and love for our place. We don’t just talk—we act: stopping AIS, securing grants, educating boaters, and protecting shores. Water is our superpower—and it works.

The Water Connects Us All Fundraising Campaign

Since 1993, MLR has connected lakeshore communities from Fairmont to Warroad. We are the trusted advisor to over 300 lake associations and 2,500 individual members statewide.

Our waters connect us all. This coalition is dedicated to protecting Minnesota’s most treasured assets. With 56% of our surface waters listed as impaired, every Minnesotan should be concerned.

The first step to reversing this trend is expanding awareness of lake and river issues in Minnesota and engaging supporters beyond lake associations and cabin owners.

This is the driving motivation behind the creation of MLR Protection and Education, a fully tax-deductible nonprofit partner of MLR Advocates. We spent 2024 organizing an engaged and active board, and developing a strategic fundraising campaign to fund the education, communication, and program side of MLR.

Staff also began reaching out to some of our long time, generous members to let them know that they could now support MLR using a tax deductible vehicle like a work through Qualified Charitable Distribution, a Donor Advised Fund, and IRA rollover, transfer of stock or even a legacy gift.

We raised \$120,000 from September through December. With this funding we have been able to launch programs that

not only help protect our lakes and rivers, but educate and make more people aware of the need to take action to reverse the disturbing water quality trends.

You have seen the impact of these gifts in this Annual Report. For MLR P&E, programs drive policy changes as awareness in the general public rises.

We hired Dylan Kinny to help grow and develop MLR Protection and Education while also building membership in MLR Advocates.

A University of Minnesota graduate with degrees in Political and Environmental Science, Dylan brings experience in political campaign management, including work for Congresswoman Kelly Morrison. He joins the MLR team with a passion for protecting Minnesota's waters and the skills to strengthen our movement.

Dylan's passion for lakes comes from working as an AIS inspector. He notes, "It was during my training as an AIS inspector, that I started to fully understand the risk to our lakes and rivers. There are thousands of young people like me that

have been AIS inspectors and learned this."

With Dylan's help, MLR Protection and Education is diversifying and sustaining funding to expand Lake Steward, launch a City of Lake Stewards pilot with student internships, grow our Stop Starry and ABC efforts to combat AIS spread, and build a statewide water quality program.

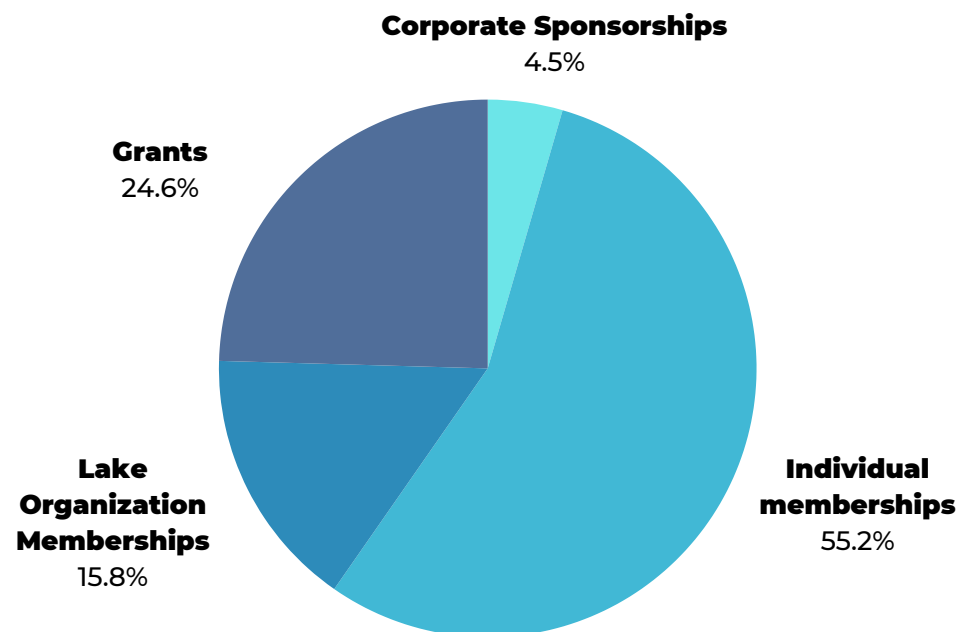
